

# GENERAL INFORMATION ABOUT THE ORGANIZATION





### **WHO WE ARE**

The BINAA Organization for Development was established in 2013 by a group of Syrian engineers, entrepreneurs and expatriates who have worked in engineering and humanitarian fields in many countries. Rehabilitation and rebuilding affected communities are the core of the BINAA mandate.

These include the provision of a safe and decent living environment for the conflict-affected population via the effective utilization of acquired engineering experiences and methodologies, with the aim of restoring destroyed communities by introducing durable solutions, and efficient energy, water and services infrastructure systems.

The creation of BINAA was the natural evolution of this mandate. BINAA's founders sa

that community involvement, humanitarian response and preparedness in rebuilding Syria were essential to providing support, development and empowerment to communities and individuals in need.

Licensed in January 2014, in Turkey, Bl-NAA is a non-governmental, non-profit humanitarian organization that utilizes community involvement to identify and provide support, development and empowerment to communities and individuals in need: Bl-NAA operates based on the understanding that sustainable development and societal participation are essential in helping communities identify their needs.

### WHAT WE DO

BINAA implements services in multiple sectors, including Shelter, Water, sanitation and Hygiene (WASH), Camp Coordination and Camp Management (CCCM), Nutrition, Education, Protection, Food Security, and Early Recovery and Livelihoods in addition to many other programs and initiatives. The Organization considers each of its programs as a communication platform: its teams, volunteers, partners and local communities share their experiences, propose and provide a group of services that address critical needs, and implement feasible and targeted solutions. Benefiting from collective and accumulated experience, these solutions are contextually designed to consider to current and changing realities and to help local communities in a sustainable manner.

In its operations, BINAA adheres to a disciplined methodology to develop, implement,

monitor, and evaluate its operations and utputs to ensure accountability to communities and partners, while upholding BINAA's values, vision, and mission and humanitarian work principles. BINAA coordinatesclosely with the local communities in which it operates, thus limiting risk while ensuring community participation and support.

Our partnerships with local and international NGOs and UN agencies have allowed us to secure funding to implement humanitarian and developmental projects and provide services to more than four million beneficiaries.

BINAA will continue working to provide services inside Syria and expand its outreach to local communities outside of Syria, to meet the humanitarian and developmental needs of communities and individuals affected by conflicts in the region.



### **OUR HUMAN RESOURCES**


#### **BINAA STAFF**

### **Our Programs**

BINAA approach goes beyond handing out goods. We engage with communities, local and international organizations, and UN agencies in the region to help people fleeing their homes to cope with the enormous demographic shifts that have taken place, adapt to their new lives and livelihoods, and build resilience.

We do this with a focus on dual accountability – to the communities whom we are committed to helping and to the donors who trust BINAA to use their resources wisely and effectively. As a result, we consistently monitor our operational, risk management and transparency processes to ensure that our partners and stakeholders have access to all project information and updates simultaneously.

BINAA covers services in ten sectors for communities and individuals in need, focusing on food security, shelter & NFI, Early recovery, protection, nutrition, logistics, education, health, CCCM and WASH activities.

## SHELTER & NFI



2022 witnessed huge efforts by BINAA teams in the Shelter and NFI sector, providing lifesaving assistance to people fleeing violence through the reconstruction/construction of shelter units, installation/insulation of tents, winterization support, rehabilitation of existing shelters, and the provision of appropriate NFI kits. BINAA' S/NFI programming reflects a broad and holistic approach,

aiming to ensure that all activities promote gender equality,livelihoods, well-being, and health. BINAA Shelter and NFI responses are context-specific and informed by the diversity of needs and experiences of the communities in which we work.


- 89 New dignified Shelter Units Established.
- 425 Damaged or unfinished housing rehabilitated.

# Water, Sanitation and Hygiene







## Water, Sanitation and Hygiene



BINAA's work in WASH continued in 2022. with interventions divided into a number of categories. Water supply was largely dependent on trucking. Activities also focused on water quality, including periodic testing and provision of storage containers to avoid contamination. Environmental health included providing solid waste management service through garbage collection and disposal at approved sites. With adequate supplies of water, hygiene promotion was complemented by distributions of WASH NFIs, which allowed putting learnings into practice without having to spend limited financial resources on supplies.

Sanitation was also covered by construction of latrines with special consideration for access and safety of females and the disabled to ensure protection principles can be applied.

In areas with permanent settlements, BI-NAA has concentrated on expanding existing water and sanitation systems. In order to keep pumping stations operational BINAA has provided diesel fuel to run the engines, supplies for water treatment with chlorination before it enters the distribution pipelines, and testing water quality to ensure it is safe for human consumption.

### **Nutrition**




BINAA implemented extensive nutrition programming in 2022 that aims to strengthen preventive nutrition services for vulnerable population groups, focusing on infant and child emergency needs, micronutrient interventions and optimal maternal nutrition; improve equitable access to therapeutic nutrition services via the systematic

identification, referral, and treatment of acutely malnourished children under five years of age (Infant and Young Child Feeding (IYCF); establish coordinated and integrated nutrition programs across relevant sectors through joint programming; and strengthen targeted and evidence-based systems to inform need-based programming.

- 72,691 children (6-59 months) screened for acute malnutrition.
- 15,869 pregnant women and caregivers of children under 24 months of age counselled as one on one on appropriate IYCF-E and maternal nutri tion.
- 2,051 PLWs trained on family MUAC approach.
- 4,902 boys and girls (6-23 months) enrolled in Blanket Supplementary Feeding Program.
- children (6-59 months) reached with MNPs.
- PLW reached with MAM treatment.

# Camp Coordination & Camp Management (CCCM)



BINAA CCCM programs seeks to improve the living conditions of displaced persons living in camps or camp-like settings, by guaranteeing that populations are protected and have equitable access to basic services. Through camp management and displacement tracking, BINAA aims to improve the living conditions of displaced persons by monitoring displacement movements and facilitating the effective provision of assistance and protection to IDPs in displacement sites/camps and camp-like settings. These initiatives include providing IDPs with FSL – Shelter – NFI – WASH – Education – and protection services.

Creative solutions are employed to improve the quality of life for those in the camps, such as the use of alternative clean power sources.

BINAA supports and coordinates stream-lined humanitarian lifesaving, multisectoral assistance and strengthening the basic infrastructural support in IDP sites, and works on improving the management quality by providing life-saving and life-sustaining humanitarian assistance to the most vulnerable conflict-affected IDPs.

### Early Recovery



BINAA is mainly focusing on enhancing resilience in communities through impact projects for restoring and stabilizing livelihoods and facilitating income generation to avoid further destitution, marginalization, and dependence on aid. Special focus is put on vulnerable groups such as IDPs, youth, women-headed households, and people with disabilities. Our projects include labor intensive emergency employment for repairing basic community infrastructure

and improving service delivery (such as cash-for-work schemes to collect solid waste and remove debris), as well as provision of emergency support for the restoration and rehabilitation of roads and Drainage systems. We also promote social cohesion and reconciliation through community-based support and capacity development initiatives.

### **Education**




BINAA provides safe and adequate learning environments for conflict affected IDPs and host communities' children through the rehabilitation of dilapidated classrooms and schools, establishment of classrooms, and provision of school furniture including white boards and student desks. BINAA supports students with learning kits and teachers with monthly incentives to ensure that children have access to quality education and teaching kits. BINAA helps increase children's resilience in coping with the impacts of extreme and harsh winters through provision of appropriate, genderand age-specific winter clothing kits and fuel for heating.

BINAA education interventions contribute to raising community awareness about the importance of education for children through community-based campaigns with targeted messages.

Child-Friendly Spaces are a common feature of BINAA programming, especially during emergencies, as we strive to provide a safe environment for children to spend their time meaningfully and to help children who have been affected by disasters recover and feel normal again. Hence, BINAA supports semi-structured recreational activities to involve children and adolescents and engage them in games and sport activities through distributing recreational kits. These activities have the multifold goal of supporting the release of energy and anxiety through physical play, and promoting the development of important life-skills such as teamwork and cooperation, negotiation, empathy, and managing anger and stress.

### **Food Security**



Food security has been a consistent area of focus for BINAA, both as standalone programs and projects combined with initiatives in the health, nutrition, and NFI sectors. BINAA's food security programming strives to ensure optimum health, growth, and development for families, particularly children, by addressing Syrians' urgent need for basic necessities and access to food.

BINAA analyzes the context and circumstances of livelihood vulnerability in both urgent situations

and chronic crises. This analysis helps BINAA better comprehend vulnerability, needs, and preferences and is essential to the creation of comprehensive, integrated solutions that support long-lasting solutions.

One of BINAA initiatives under FSL was the distribution of Bread Bundles for 9624 affected families in 22 locations across Idleb and Aleppo governorates. Families were provided with bread bundles on daily basis for more than 2 years.

### **Protection**



BINAA's Protection program addresses the safety of at-risk groups in Syrian societies through child protection and women & girls safe spaces activities. These include planned and scheduled psychosocial support activities, recreational activities, awareness-raising sessions, parental skills sessions, and case management. The program primarily focuses on cases of gender-based violence (GBV) and child abuse.

BINAA's protection services include the distribution of dignity kits and awareness brochures to targeted families; distribution of recreational and early childhood development kits that aim to provide an appropriate environment to children affected by conflict; and implementation of numerous projects in Aleppo and Idlib directed towards providing an appropriate environment to children affected by the conflict.
